KEVICC Sports Day

Sports Day is always a fantastic event for the whole College to enjoy and always comes with the challenges of the weather! The day started for us at 7am with setting up the field ready for the big event.

Last year we introduced two new events - Archery and Wacky Races - which allowed

students to compete in mixed teams. **Wacky Races** took prime position in front of the spectators - some even ran the last 50m! Two records were beaten - the Girls Year 7 Shot Putt, which has stood since 2001 at 7.14m, was broken by Jasmine Scott-Taylor who threw 7.73m. The Year 9 Boys Long Jump record, which has stood since 1996 at 5.20m, was broken by Harvey Harrington jumping 5.24m.

Two Year 10 boys, Shay Pomeroy and Stephano Catalano won the 100m races in 11.76 secs, breaking our record that has stood for 30 years! Year 9 Babbage Boys Relay A team set a new record of 52.66 seconds.

The day ended with the presentation of the trophies. The house shield was presented to Davis with 1332 points (unbeaten for two years). Shelly O'Leary, Year 10, won the The Anchor Cup - our Endeavour Cup, presented in loving memory of ex-student Tom Perrin - and awarded for potential and for those who inspire others by overcoming challenges and are true team players.
