So .. what's it like at uni?

Some of our best linguists in Spanish and French went to Exeter University to have a taster of learning languages at University. They were first given a tour of the university by the University Languages Ambassadors. They saw the students' union, the library, the different study rooms, interactive rooms and sports fields.

Then they were split into languages and had a language lesson, together with students from other schools. During these, the students experienced university lectures taught by the Exeter University Professors and it was very good for our students to realise that actually they knew far more than they thought! They had two language sessions and then, finally, met with students who had, or were planning to, spend a year abroad as part of their course. They explained what the year was about, recounting their personal experiences for our students.



Good use of a year before uni ...

We have caught up with ex-KEVICC student, Alice Giorgi, who studied Spanish and German A Levels last year, and is going on to study these languages at Bath University in September. Alice has had a year out working in Germany and Spain, and got in touch to tell us about working at a Spanish school.

I am working as an assistant at school in Lleida, Cataluña which caters for children from kindergarten age up to 16. I've been taking conversation classes with groups of about 6 students from both the primary and secondary age groups, and helping teachers in the kindergarten and lower primary classes as a general classroom assistant. I have also been preparing activities especially for the Cambridge Exams – the English exams that students who are learning English take. There are about 100 students who I see on a weekly basis.

It has been really interesting living in Cataluña during what is a very exciting time politically, as some Catalans want independence from the rest of Spain. I am staying with a very nice host family who look after me really well and organise trips at the weekends. There's lots to see & do in nearby Barcelona. However, I have found the work quite challenging and there have been times when I have been left in sole charge of a class of 20 students! Also, being in Cataluña, everyone speaks Catalan rather than Castillian, which is the language we were taught at school, so I have had to learn some Catalan.'

.. & the first year away

Before travelling to university I realised how much I would truly be leaving behind and that was the moment I really began to feel nervous – and worried about money.

Onc there, I went into the kitchen and, one by one, was joined by my new flatmates. We spent the evening together, laughing and getting to know each other. Now, at the end of my first year at Exeter University, I can honestly say that those six people I was initially so scared to introduce myself to are friends for life. Living with people that are in exactly the same boat as me has really helped – we encourage each other, and are there for each other when the stresses of deadlines are upon us.

Being at university gives you the freedom to live independently and to be yourself, whilst studying a course you have always wanted to study. Of course there are times that you find more difficult than others, but first year at university has been a wonderful experience that I will never forget.'
