Totnes Hustings

KEVICC has been attempting to encourage youth participation in politics and expand students' knowledge in readiness for voting in this year's elections. KEVICC held a Hustings for the main five candidates in the forthcoming General Election in the Ariel Theatre. This was organised by Trixie Foster and two students from each of the secondary schools based in the constituency. The students developed the questions

beforehand and put them to the candidates on the night, with Sixth Form students from the five schools making up the audience.

Stimulating discussion then took place, with candidates having to justify their positions and real differences of opinion being offered to students. Students gave very positive feedback, feeling that their views were being listened to, and that the event made them more likely to vote and take part in politics wherever possible.

The night kicked off with a question about affordable housing in the South West; then the topic moved on to Education, Environment, post-16 further education and apprenticeships and finally the EU. As people were leaving, I asked how they'd found the evening. There was certainly a buzz in the theatre as people were discussing many of the issues which had arisen from the evening. There was a general consensus that students were now more aware of their candidates and what their parties stood for, in preparation for voting in the General Election 2015 on 7 May. Paul Tiony, tea producer from Kenya, spent a morning at KEVICC explaining to year 5 children from Marldon, St. John's and The Grove Primary Schools both how tea is transformed from a leaf to tea in our cups, and about tea growing worldwide. The children left determined to promote the use of Fairtrade at home and in their schools.

Paul was accompanied by Totnes Mayor, Jaqui Hodgson, who explained to the children that Totnes is a Fairtrade Town. They answered quizzes; made posters; asked Paul searching questions about production; wages and working conditions in his company and entered tea pot designs in a competition.
