Google Pioneer Program: virtual expeditions in the classroom

Imagine exploring coral reefs or the surface of Mars in an afternoon! With Expeditions, teachers can take students on immersive, virtual journeys - guided tours of places from all over the universe. These expeditions are comprised of virtual reality panoramas and are led by a guide or teacher. **When the Geography Department read that this academic year the Google Expeditions teams would be visiting selected schools around the UK, they never dreamed that KEVICC might be chosen as one of the lucky ones. But they were delighted when they were!** The team are visiting KEVICC at the beginning of November and will bring a complete Expeditions kit, with everything the teachers need to bring their classroom to life and take their students on journeys to virtually anywhere.

My favourite recipe is one for gout:

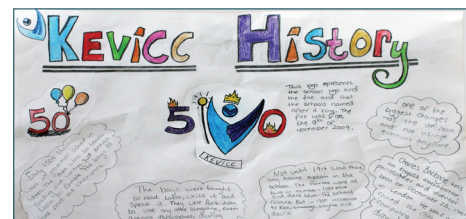
1. First take an owl and pluck it clean and open it.

After a very moving trip to visit the WW1 Battlefields in France earlier in the year, our History Department was delighted to be able to acquire one of the 19,240 figures created by artist Rob Heard to commemorate every British soldier who died on first day of the Battle of the Somme in 1916. Rob spent six months handcrafting each of the 12-inch figures.

Each figure took on its own form as they were wrapped, twisting and bending into their own unique shape. They were poignantly wrapped and bound in a shroud, every one hand-stitched by Rob, who recited out loud the name of each soldier as he finished their shroud. All but one of the symbolic shrouds were laid out at Northernhay Gardens in Exeter, and the final one was added during a ceremony held to mark the moment when troops first went 'over the top' at 7.30am on 1 July 1916.

Rob said: *The idea was to physicalise the number - to illustrate the enormity of the horror which unfolded.*



Students in years 7-11 have a termly Curriculum Enrichment Day when usual lessons are replaced by other opportunities to enrich the curriculum teaching. Our year 8s spent a recent CE day researching the history of KEVICC, with particular reference to the 50th anniversary of its becoming a Comprehensive, and finding out more about those whom the Houses are named after. After using books, the internet and interviewing staff, each group of students put together a presentation, given to the whole of year 8, plus invited staff – with a surprise guest, former Principal Stephen Jones.
