Intermediate Maths Challenge February 2014

Congratulations to our pupils who entered the Intermediate Maths Challenge – the nationwide challenge run by the UK Mathematics Trust. Our students achieved 22 bronze awards, 8 silver and 3 gold. Both Ethan Merrington-Pink in Year 10 (awarded Best in the school) and Michael Flanagan in Year 9 have proceeded to the next level of the challenge – the Kangaroo papers – a big well done to you all!

Senior Team Maths Challenge March 2014

Four students across Year 12 and 13 went to Coombe Dean School to take part in the regional heat of the Senior Team Maths Challenge. It is a competition testing mathematical, communication and teamwork skills and the students are put through their paces for a gruelling three hours of mind bending problems. Jo Parke, Bruce Clark, Libby Goult and Sam Endean are some of KEVICC's top mathematicians, studying both Maths and Further Maths at A level, and approached the challenges set before them with clear and logical mathematical thinking. They came 11th out of twenty teams, a very respectable position against stiff competition.

Team Maths Challenge 2014

Michael Flanagan, Tyler Walton, Felicity Dunn and Ewan Baker represented KEVICC at the Regional Final of the UKMT 2014 Team Maths Challenge in Plymouth Guildhall, this March. The challenges were aimed at gifted and talented students and had four rounds. The first round was the students working as a group to solve problems, the second round was a cross number, the third round was a shuttle relay and the final round was a team relay.

There were 23 different schools represented at the regional finals AND, due to hard work and effort, KEVICCs team did extremely well coming in at second place, with Devonport High School for Girls coming first and Plymstock third.

Shakespeare, Performed Just As You Like It!

In an evening of laughter and frivolity, The Tobacco Factory Theatre in Bristol served as the host of a tremendous performance of William Shakespeare's tale of love and redemption, 'As You Like It'. Updated to a more contemporary setting, the characters were fabulously clad in the attire of the Roaring Twenties - high-waist widelegged trousers, double-breasted waistcoats, chunky military trench coats - and the performances were interpreted like the cast of a zany modern rom-com, with the actor of the lovestruck Orlando in particular seeming to channel the awkward romanticisms of Hugh Grant.

The theatre itself was much like a dance studio with a classroomsized space for the actors to perform in, encompassed on a near-360 degree radius with approximately 300 seats. With no designated upstage or downstage, just this small spectator's ring, the performance felt rather intimate as the actors all varied in the amount of time they spent looking out towards you. The trip was both to serve the interests of all Year 12 English students – as we are going to study the play next year for our A2 studies - and a few of the Year 13 Drama students who also accompanied us. Given that my exposure to Shakespeare has been nothing beyond cursory studies for my GCSEs, I did greatly 'As You Like It' - the humour in it is bold and resplendently clever; and the language itself, which I feared would be indecipherable, is generally quite comprehendible!
