## How will I be assessed?

There are three exams in French at the end of Year 13.

Paper 1- Listening, Reading and Translation into English and French (2h30; 100 marks) Paper 2- Writing, an essay on the book No et Moi and an essay on the film La Haine (2 hours; 80 marks)

Paper 3- Speaking on topics and an Individual Research Project (25 minutes; 60 marks)

## How will I organise my notes?

You will be given an A4 exercise book, a vocabulary booklet, a grammar booklet, a speaking booklet, a revision booklet on the topics of the specification, a booklet on the film and the book, a revision booklet for both. You will take your own detailed notes in your exercise book and you will keep the worksheets organised in a folder, with dividers separating each topic. You will have weekly homework (about 2 hours). Each half term, you will be set a list of speaking questions on the topic studied to complete for homework. You will also have a Guided Learning booklet of tasks to complete outside of lessons, which will support your understanding and recall of what you are learning in lessons.
